

Quick Reference Guide: How to Obtain Medical Marijuana

STEP 1: VISIT A PHYSICIAN WITH A CERTIFICATE TO RECOMMEND

The first step to become a medical marijuana patient is to establish and maintain a physician-patient relationship with a physician holding an active certificate to recommend (CTR) issued by the State Medical Board of Ohio.

- An in-person visit with a certified physician is required at least once per year.
- On March 18, 2020, the State Medical Board of Ohio met and <u>voted to suspend</u>
 <u>enforcement of telemedicine regulations</u> for licensees during the COVID-19 pandemic.
 This will allow physicians with a CTR to use telemedicine in place of in-person visits to make recommendations and renewals for medical marijuana.
- The physician holding a CTR must confirm you have a qualifying condition to recommend the use of medical marijuana. By law, patients with one of the following medical conditions may currently participate in Ohio's medical marijuana program:
 - AIDS
 - o Alzheimer's disease
 - o Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis
 - o Cachexia [added by Medical Board on 7/8/2020]
 - Cancer
 - Chronic traumatic encephalopathy
 - o Crohn's disease
 - Epilepsy or another seizure disorder
 - Fibromyalgia
 - Glaucoma

- Hepatitis C
- Inflammatory bowel disease
- Multiple sclerosis
- Pain that is either chronic and severe or intractable
- o Parkinson's disease
- Positive status for HIV
- Post-traumatic stress disorder
- o Sickle cell anemia
- Spinal cord disease or injury
- Tourette syndrome
- Traumatic brain injury
- Ulcerative colitis
- Certified physicians have access to the Patient Registry and will submit their recommendations for a patient to receive medical marijuana directly to the Patient Registry.

Quick Reference Guide: How to Obtain Medical Marijuana

- The physician will need the patient's valid Ohio driver's license, a valid Ohio identification card issued by the Ohio bureau of motor vehicles (BMV), or a valid United States passport.
- A registered caregiver may possess and administer medical marijuana to patients with whom the caregiver's registration is associated. The certified physician will need similar identification from a caregiver to establish their profile in the Patient Registry.
- On March 23, 2020, the State of Ohio Board of Pharmacy adopted a temporary process to register new caregivers during the COVID-19 pandemic. For more information on this process, click here.
- A certified physician can recommend up to a 90-day supply of medical marijuana with three refills (totaling up to 360-day supply if appropriate for the patient). For more information on how a 90-day supply is calculated, <u>click here.</u>

2. GET REGISTERED

- Once a recommending physician has entered a patient or caregiver into the registry, the patient/caregiver will receive an email prompting them to login to their profile in the <u>Patient Registry</u>. In the registry, complete your application and pay the fee.
- The annual cost of a medical marijuana registration is \$50 for patients and \$25 for caregivers.
 - o Patients who qualify for indigent or veteran status may be eligible for fee reductions. For more information, click here.

3. FIND A DISPENSARY

- After receiving your Patient & Caregiver Registry card, you may purchase medical marijuana from an Ohio dispensary that has received a certificate of operation by the State of Ohio Board of Pharmacy.

- Dispensary staff will counsel you on the appropriate type and dose of product for your condition.
- Only patients with an active registry card, an active recommendation, and their associated government-issued ID can purchase medical marijuana.
